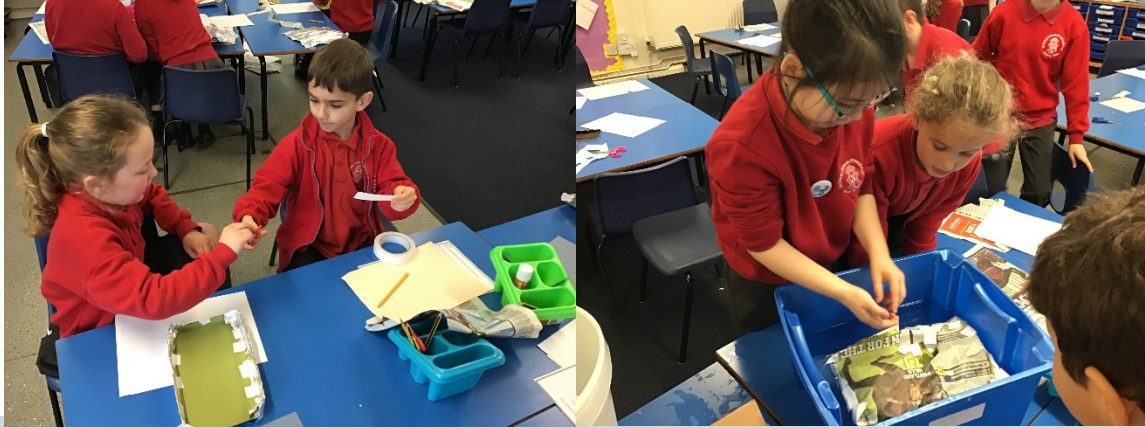


Science Update from Oak and Mulberry

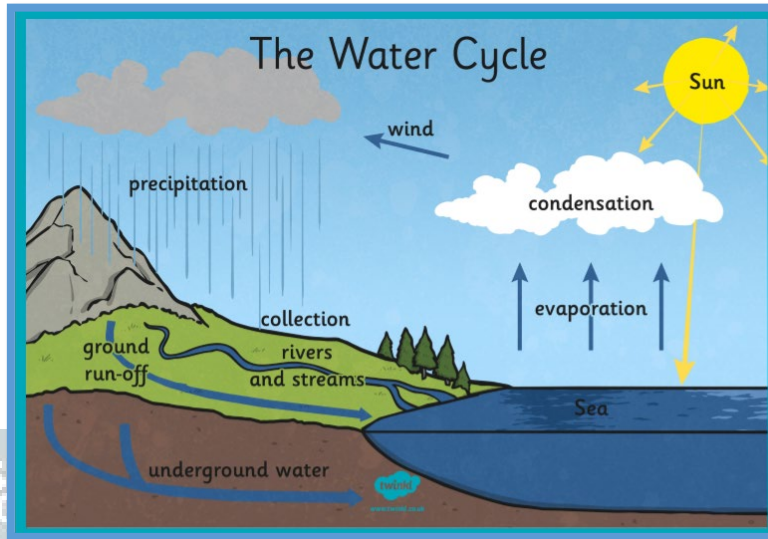


SCIENCE WEEK

Mulberry-

We are learning to... create a model of the water cycle



In Mulberry Class the children have been learning about changing states of matter and the water cycle. For this lesson the children had to create a model of the water cycle. They drew a model of the cycle onto a zip lock bag, using arrows and labels to show the different stages, before filling the bottom of the bag with dyed water. Once this bag is stuck onto a window, they should then be able to see the processes of evaporation, and condensation in action.
