any people find having a conversation, a one-to-one, a difficult thing to do. All that focus somehow makes people shy.

Conversation during a journey can often be easier. Parents find recalcitrant teenagers easier to chat to when they're together on a car journey. Friends often say what they mean during a walk. So we can imagine here that the two disciples were saying the things they really

meant on that walk to Emmaus. They were ready to face the truth – and the one who is The Truth appeared to them. Even then it took some time for the pair to realise what was happening to them. Only at the breaking of bread – the moment that recalled the Last Supper – did they realise this stranger was Jesus. It is a Gospel story that inspires us to ask: how often do we recognise Jesus in the strangers we meet? How often do we offer others our hospitality? Do we truly

recognise him when bread is broken at Mass and we have the opportunity to receive him?

The disciples on the road to Emmaus were witnesses to the truth of Christ. Christian discipleship requires that we are all prepared to serve as witnesses to him. Being a witness is not just about speaking of God, as the disciples did on that journey, but offering service too. The service of hospitality is right here, in the centre of this account of Christ, risen from the dead.

The saddest walk we'll ever take is away from the grave of a loved one. This was true of the two disciples as they tried to make sense of their loss. Unrecognised, Jesus walks with them listening to all their pain.

Focused on their doubt. disappointment, and shattered hopes, they don't recognise Jesus. But he walks and talks with them until their eyes are opened. Do we recognise the stranger walking with us in our own sorrows and disappointments? Maybe need to spend more time getting to know Jesus in the scriptures. listening to his words and our burning hearts as Jesus walks with us in our pain.

Asking Jesus to stay leads to a life-changing encounter. He is the guest who takes, blesses and breaks the bread and gives it to us, leading us to the Eucharistic recognition that he is no longer alongside us, but within us. He feeds us, not only with bread but also with himself, transforming our disappointments and our whole life.
