This template can be used for multiple purposes:

 It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

The Primary PE and sport premium guidance, outlines 5 key priorities that funding should be used towards. It is not



necessary that spending has to meet all the key priorities, you should select the priorities that you aim to use any funding towards.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.**

The Department for Education has worked closely with the Association for Physical Education (afPE) and the Youth Sport Trust (YST) to develop this template and encourages schools to use it. This template is an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

- New equipment purchased and further sets of current equipment purchased to support the delivery of a wider range of interhouse competitions and sports.
- More children were involved in schools sports competitions by joining the North Oxfordshire School Sports Partnership.

- All of the children in Key Stage 2 had the opportunity to take part in a wide range of sports and competitions.
- Eight inter-house competitions were held meaning that all 35 children in Key Stage 2 experienced eight different sports, with all of them attending at least 1 competition where they represented the school the school inter-school level. - 166 places were offered to children at sporting fixtures this year in the B.G.N partnership.

Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	45%	 It is difficult to find the space in the school timetable to fit in more slots for Year 6 children and we do not have the staff available to send with the children. We struggle to get extra sessions at our local swimming at the times we require them.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	45%	 We have a large number of non-swimmers due to a backlog from Covid. All children from Year 3 upwards attend swimming lessons for one full term each academic year and we only send children who have not met the requirements for the end of Key Stage 2.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	45%	All children are taught water self-rescue as part of their swimming sessions but their confidence varies depending on their skills.
If your schools swimming data is below national expectation, you can choose to use the Primary PE and sport premium to provide additional top-up sessions for those pupils that did not meet National Curriculum requirements after the completion of core lessons. Have you done this?	Yes/ <mark>No</mark>	We have not used the sports premium for top up sessions, as we struggle to find time in the school timetable to fit the extra sessions in. In addition to this, we do not have enough members of staff to send with children for top-up sessions or have enough pool slots available at when we require them.
Have you provided CPD to improve the knowledge and confidence of staff to be able to teach swimming and water safety?	Yes <mark>/No</mark>	We use experienced instructors provided by the local leisure centre to teach our swimmers as we feel that they have the appropriate qualifications, skill level and experience to do this.
