Farmers Class- Legoland Discovery Centre: Tuesday 7th March

The children will explore the discovery centre as part of their Brick building topic. The children will also take part in a workshop.

Fishermen Class- Ashmolean Museum Egyptian Workshop: Wednesday 22nd March.

Activity 1: What can we learn from archaeological evidence? How did the early Ancient Egyptians live? What did they eat? What would they have needed in their daily life? Pupils search for

clues in the gallery to discover how the Ancient Egyptians looked, lived and worked.

Activity 2: Three powerful Egyptians Pupils take on the role of detective to explore Ancient Egyptian sculpture, buildings and objects to find out more about their life and beliefs. Pupils will

Carpenters Class- Ashmolean Museum Ancient Greece Workshop:Thursday 23rd March.
Activity 1: The Origins of the Olympic Games Pupils will search the Cast Gallery for sculptures that tell us about sports in Ancient Greece. They will discover where and when the games began and which deities played a role in the games.
Activity 2: Evidence from objects Pupils will discover why keeping fit was so important in Ancient Greece. They will explore the Greek gallery to find images on pots that tell us more

about sport and warfare.They will handle original artefacts that tell us more about the ancient games. Activity 3: Ancient vs Modern Pupils will return to the Cast Gallery and take part in a mime-based activity highlighting the similarities and differences between the Ancient

Olympics and the modern games

Shepherds Class- Ashmolean Museum Shang Dynasty Workshop: Wednesday 22nd March.

This session explores Chinese history, culture, art and language starting with the Shang dynasty and moving on to explore the changes over time.

Activity 1: Evidence from objects and early writing. Using objects from the Shang dynasty children will learn more about life alongside the Yellow River. Pupils will look at oracle bones and discover how some aspects of Chinese writing have remained unchanged in nearly 3,000 years.

uscover now some aspects of climites writing have remained unchanged in nearly 3,000 years.
Activity 2: Looking closer. Using the Coromandel screen as their focus children will discover how Chinese objects were traded across the world and learn a Chinese song.
Activity 3: Evidence from objects. Pupils will handle original artefact's to discover more about the materials used and objects made in China. They will search the galleries for objects made

from a variety of these materials.

Activity 4: Modern writing, the zodiac and festivals. Pupils will have a go at writing Chinese Characters and make a 'Good Luck' envelope to take home.
