Keeping Our Children Safe Online



We are writing to share some important information regarding online safety, particularly considering the popular new Netflix show Adolescence. Following its release, we have been made aware of emoji and text slang that children may be using in social media messaging. As always, we want to ensure that you have the information you need to help keep your children safe online.

To support you in understanding the language and symbols your child may encounter, we are sharing a slang dictionary, which provides an overview of common abbreviations and emojis used in online communication. You can access it via this link:

You will also find attached to this letter an image that shows some of the emoji slang that children are using. Please note that this list is not exhaustive, and you should always discuss any unusual conversations with your child.

A Reminder About Online Safety and Age Limits

We would also like to take this opportunity to remind parents and carers of the age restrictions for some popular social media platforms:

Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, TikTok - 13+ and WhatsApp - 16+

While children may feel pressure to use these apps, they are not designed for younger users and can expose them to risks such as inappropriate content, cyberbullying, and online strangers. We encourage all families to have open conversations about safe and responsible internet use.
